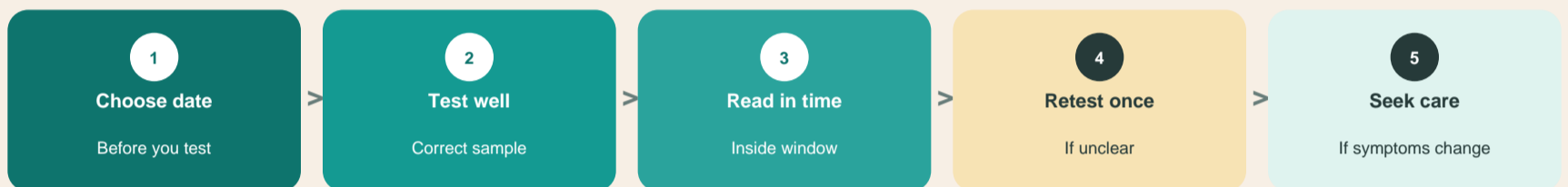


Pregnancy Test Timing Guide

A practical Australian guide for early testing, negative results, faint lines, retesting and when to seek clinical advice.



Use this guide when testing feels unclear

Choose a sensible first test date, understand why early negatives can change, read results inside the correct window and plan one calm next step.

What home tests cannot answer

A home pregnancy test cannot assess pregnancy safety, pregnancy location, viability, exact dating or the cause of pain or bleeding.

What a home test can show

A pregnancy test checks urine for hCG. A result only applies to that test, at that time, when used as instructed.

What it cannot show

It cannot confirm pregnancy safety, pregnancy location, viability, exact dating, miscarriage, ectopic pregnancy or the cause of symptoms.

Use symptoms page first

If pain, heavy bleeding, shoulder-tip pain, dizziness, fainting or feeling very unwell is part of the picture, use Page 9 before testing again.

Choose your first test date

The expected period date is usually the clearest practical anchor for home pregnancy testing.

Timing	What to know	Best next step
Before 10 DPO	Usually too early for a reliable home-testing answer.	Wait if you can.
10 to 12 DPO	Some positives may appear, but negatives can still change.	Test only if you accept that retesting may be needed.
13 to 14 DPO	Often clearer if ovulation timing was tracked closely.	Use first-morning urine if testing early.
Expected period date	A clearer practical test point for most home users.	Test and read inside the stated window.
After missed period	Usually clearer than very early testing.	Test, or retest if an earlier result was negative or unclear.

Use DPO carefully

DPO means days past ovulation. It is still an estimate unless ovulation was clinically confirmed. A positive ovulation test, app prediction, cervical mucus change or temperature pattern can help with timing, but none of these date ovulation with certainty.

Why early negatives can change

hCG may not be high enough in urine yet. If you test before your expected period and the result is negative, the next useful step is usually waiting and retesting later, not repeating tests several times on the same day.

Simple timing view



Negative before period due

A negative result before your period is due means hCG was not detected at that testing time. It does not always settle the answer.

What it can mean

You may not be pregnant. You may have tested before hCG was high enough to detect. Ovulation may have happened later than expected. Your expected period date may be wrong if your cycle varies.

What to do next

Choose one next test time before you test again. If you tested several days before your period is due, wait until the expected period date if you can. If you are close to that date, retest in 24 to 48 hours if bleeding has not started.

What not to do

Do not treat repeated same-day negative tests as clearer evidence. Do not keep checking a dry test after the read window. Do not use a negative result to ignore symptoms that worry you.

Plain rule

A negative result before the expected period is often a timing problem. The safest next step is to wait for the planned retest time, then use symptoms and cycle dates to decide whether you need clinical advice.

Good next action

Write one retest date. Use first-morning urine if you are testing early or after an unclear result. Record the result inside the read window.

Poor next action

Testing several more times on the same day, checking dry tests, editing photos, or looking for a darker line to feel safer.

Negative after expected period

A negative result after your expected period makes pregnancy less likely, but timing can still shift if ovulation happened later than expected.

Late ovulation can change the timing

If ovulation happened later, your period may also be later. hCG timing may also be later than expected. This is why a single home test may not match what your app or usual cycle predicted.

Situation	Next step
Period starts	Record the date as cycle day 1. No further pregnancy testing is usually needed for that cycle unless symptoms worry you.
Period has not started and test is negative	Retest in 24 to 48 hours, or follow your test instructions if they give a specific retest interval.
Period remains late and tests stay negative	Speak with a GP if the result does not match your usual cycle pattern or symptoms.
Cycles are often irregular	Use the result as one piece of information. A GP can help decide whether cycle review is needed.
Symptoms worry you	Use clinical advice instead of waiting for another test.

What to record

Write down the expected period date, test date, result, whether the control line appeared and your planned next step. This helps you avoid relying on memory or checking old tests again.

When home testing is not enough

Use GP advice if repeated results do not match your usual cycle, if uncertainty continues, or if symptoms are part of the picture.

Faint line inside read time

A faint coloured line inside the read time may indicate hCG if the control line also appears.

The next step is planned follow-up, not guessing what the line means.



Can mean

hCG may be present. The result may become clearer if hCG rises and you retest later. A very early result may still need confirmation.

Cannot prove

A faint line cannot confirm exact timing, viability, location, safety or the cause of pain or bleeding.

Next step

Retest with first-morning urine in 24 to 48 hours, or arrange GP or midwife confirmation.

Safety boundary

If you have a positive or likely positive result, a GP or midwife can help confirm the pregnancy and discuss next steps. If symptoms worry you, use Page 9 before comparing line darkness.

Question	Use this answer
Was the line coloured?	A coloured line inside the read time may indicate hCG.
Did the control line appear?	If no control line appears, do not interpret the result.
Did the line appear after the read time?	Use Page 7. Do not count late marks as positive.
Are there symptoms?	Use Page 9. Symptoms override line comparison.

Mark after read time

A mark that appears after the read window should not be treated as a positive result.

Read-time rule

The valid result is the result seen inside the stated read time for that test.

What you see	What to do
A line appears after the read window	Do not count it as a positive result.
A grey or colourless mark appears where a line could be	Do not treat it as a positive result.
The test looks different once dry	Do not use the dry test as new evidence.
A photo looks different after editing or changing light	Use the read-time result, not the edited photo.
No control line appears	Do not interpret the test. Use a new test if needed.

Photo-checking tip

A photo can help you remember what you saw inside the read time. It should not replace the test instructions, the read window or your retest plan.

Better next step

If you are still unsure, use a new test at the next planned time. Do not keep rechecking the same dry test.

Retesting decision table

Use this page to choose one next action. The aim is to stop repeated checking and keep symptoms separate from home-test timing.

Before expected period

Negative

NEXT

Wait until the expected period date, or retest in 24 to 48 hours if already testing early.

STOP

Stop same-day repeats.

OVERRIDE

Symptoms that worry you need care, not another test.

Expected period date

Negative

NEXT

Retest in 24 to 48 hours if bleeding has not started.

STOP

Stop after your planned retest and use GP advice if uncertainty continues.

OVERRIDE

Pain, heavy bleeding, shoulder-tip pain, dizziness or fainting override timing.

After missed period

Negative

NEXT

Retest once if your period remains absent, then speak with a GP if dates and results do not match.

STOP

Stop repeated daily testing if the answer remains unclear.

OVERRIDE

Symptoms override home testing.

Any timing

Faint line

NEXT

Retest with first-morning urine in 24 to 48 hours or arrange GP or midwife confirmation.

STOP

Stop comparing dry tests or edited photos.

OVERRIDE

Pain or bleeding needs care, not line comparison.

Any timing

Mark after read time

NEXT

Do not count it. Use a new test only if still needed.

STOP

Stop checking the dry test.

OVERRIDE

Symptoms override another test.

Any timing

Invalid result

NEXT

Use a new test and check the instructions.

STOP

Stop interpreting the invalid result.

OVERRIDE

Symptoms override retesting.

Positive or likely positive

Line inside read time

NEXT

Arrange GP or midwife confirmation.

STOP

Stop chasing darker lines for safety reassurance.

OVERRIDE

Urgent symptoms need prompt care.

Good retest plan

A good retest plan answers three questions: when will I test next, what result will change my plan, and what symptoms mean I should seek care instead?

Symptoms that change the plan

Some symptoms should change the plan from home testing to clinical advice.

Home-test safety limit

A home pregnancy test cannot assess pregnancy location, pregnancy safety, miscarriage risk or another urgent cause of symptoms. It also cannot explain pain, heavy bleeding, dizziness, fainting or feeling very unwell.

Situation	Examples	Action
Routine GP or midwife confirmation	Positive or likely positive test without worrying symptoms.	Book GP or midwife confirmation and next-step advice.
Prompt medical advice	Ongoing pain, bleeding that worries you, repeated uncertainty with symptoms, or feeling unwell.	Contact a GP, midwife, local urgent-care service or healthdirect for advice.
Emergency care or triple zero	Severe lower abdominal pain, one-sided pelvic pain, heavy bleeding, shoulder-tip pain, dizziness, fainting, collapse or feeling very unwell.	Call triple zero or seek urgent emergency care if symptoms are severe or you are worried about immediate safety.

Do not wait for a darker line if symptoms worry you

Line darkness is not a safety check. A faint line, negative result or unclear result should not delay care if your symptoms feel concerning.

Pregnancy test routine

A clear routine helps avoid avoidable errors. Always read the product instructions before testing.

Before testing

Check the expiry date. Use the test as instructed. Use first-morning urine if testing early or retesting after an unclear result. Set a timer before reading. Have a place to write down the result.

While testing

Follow the sample instructions for your test format. Keep the result window facing up if the instructions say to lay the test flat. Check that the control line appears. Read inside the stated read window.

If the control line does not appear

The result is invalid. Do not interpret it, even if another line appears. Use a new test if you still need an answer, and check the instructions again before retesting.

After testing

Record the date, time, result and next action. Then put the test away. Do not use changes after the read window as a new result.

Instruction reminder

The packet instructions control sample method, timing, read window and invalid-result rules. Use the final action page to open Fertility2Family product instructions.

Choose a test format

Pregnancy test strips and pregnancy midstream tests both check urine for hCG. Choose the format that fits how you are most likely to test correctly.

Routine fit, not medical certainty

This is a routine-fit choice, not a medical certainty choice.

Format	Best fit	Main limit
Pregnancy test strips	Repeated testing across several days, lower cost per test, and readers comfortable using a clean cup.	Requires dipping, a clean sample container and careful read-window timing.
Pregnancy midstream tests	Larger direct-test format, simpler handling preference and no separate cup when used in-stream.	Still depends on timing, correct use and reading inside the stated window.

Choose strips if

You expect to test more than once. You are comfortable using a clean, dry cup. You want a lower cost per test for planned retesting.

Choose midstream if

You prefer a larger test format. You want direct-test handling. You are less comfortable dipping a strip.

Same safety limit for both

Neither format can confirm pregnancy safety, pregnancy location, viability or exact dating. A positive or likely positive result still needs GP or midwife confirmation.

Write one action only. Example: retest in 48 hours, book GP confirmation, wait until period date, or seek care if symptoms worsen.

Do not use this worksheet to delay care if symptoms worry you.

Use this page after you have chosen your timing, read the result inside the window and decided whether retesting or clinical advice is the next step.

1. Read product instructions

Open the instructions before using a test, especially if the result was invalid, faint or unclear.

Arrange GP or midwife confirmation after a positive or likely positive home test. Seek prompt advice sooner if pain, bleeding, dizziness, fainting or feeling very unwell is part of the picture.
